1. Why are you seeking your office?

3. What distinguishes your candidacy?

I am a distinctive leader and problem-solver respectfully speaking truth to power. Racism and bigotry are the foundations of U.S. ailments. To solve these problems, I speak openly to develop solutions for justice, equality and equity for ALL people because my DNA mix is:

4. Pick any one issue. Expand on how you will address it.

Increasing GA's minimum wage of \$5.15/ hour to a living wage of \$15+ per hour is a priority issue. Studies show that to afford a basic two-bedroom apartment in

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metro-Atlanta, you would need to make at least \$17 per hour — three times GA's minimum wage. The poverty level of Gwinnett is alarming. SD9 includes Dacula, Grayson, Lawrenceville, Lilburn, Loganville, Mountain Park and Snellville. Lawrenceville has 21.5% of the residents living below the poverty line. That is more than 1.5 times the rate in metro-Atlanta area (13.1%), and about 1.3 times the rate of GA (16%). This must change.

5. Suggest ways to jump-start the economy after COVID-19.

Georgia's economy can receive a COVID-19 jump-start now by providing a COVID-19 debt-relief program to all households as provided by the existing Georgia Emergency Management Agency's "Individuals and Household Program." The program is available during a disaster and federally-funded. There are two program components including "Other Needs Assistance" that provides for replacement of essential goods and services. My contention is that under the stay-at-home mandate, a household's rent/mortgage and utilities are essential services. The program allows up to \$34,900/household for essential services, and can be authorized by the governor.
